



COORDINATED SYSTEM OF CARE

This document is provided to Family Support Organizations to give basic information and guidance regarding the Statewide Coordinating Council. It may be revised, as needed.

Statewide Coordinating Council – The Basics

- The State Coordinating Council, among other mandates TBD, will exist to:
 - Work as part of the State Governance structure
 - Provide structure, consistency, oversight, guidance and support to the community-based Local Coordinating Councils
 - In addition,
 - The State Coordinating Council will have a membership that is volunteer with supports designed to facilitate participation
 - Be staffed and supported by the CSoC State Team Family Lead
 - Specific parameters to SCC operation TBD by Implementation Workgroup
 - SCC Policies and Procedures by council itself
 - 60% family representation
 - 2 family members from each of the regions
 - 12 representatives from collaborating local and state agencies as well as community leaders, clergy, business and civic leaders, providers, etc.
 - Ensures the capacity of family members to provide representation on the Governance Board
 - Provides guidance and support to the CSoC State Team Family Lead
 - Provides technical assistance and support to regions
 - Provides direct assistance and ongoing support of local Family Support Organizations
 - Provides training and coordination for Local Coordinating Councils
 - Acts as a liaison between local FSOs and Governance Board
 - Assists Governance Board in carrying out duties as assigned including identifying gaps in services
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- Each LCC will select (via its own internal nomination/election process) 2 family members to serve on the SCC
 - Each LCC will propose 2 non-family members for potential participation on the SCC
 - SCC meeting frequency: Quarterly, 2-3 weeks before the State Governing Board meeting
 - Potential date/time for the initial meeting: **July 13, from 1-4** (this would allow farther regions to drive in and drive out on the same day)
